The six of us arrived at the QuiNhon, actually PhuTai, detachment in May 1967 as brand new, fresh out of the wrapper, dog handlers. I pulled my first shift at midnight. Before we loaded the 3/4 ton to go out to our kennels at the ammo dump we were to guard we stopped at the connex to receive our M16s and two magazines of ammo. We asked how to operate them as we'd never even held one before. We were told not to worry, we'd figure it out.

I was lucky. My dog Jose already did a hitch in country and was one of the best as I would find out that year. I got dropped off at post #5. Half way down that post was a short road that lead to the guard tower at the perimeter. As we started walking down that road Jose started crawling on his belly and whimpering. As they instructed us in Okinawa, if you don't see what your dog does, look between his ears and down his nose. That I did and holy crap! There was a large black cat as tall as

my dog and about a third longer was strolling just outside the perimeter. It jumped on top of a large boulder outside of the perimeter and sat there majestically looking around. After a while it jumped down and strode into the forest on the mountainside. When I thought it was safe I went to tower and called up and told the guy about the cat and asked if I should shoot it. He said that if I do to make sure I kill it. I then asked him how do I operate this weapon. He told me then I heard him wake up the other guy and tell him, "Guess what, were gonna lose this war".

That was just the start of the adventure that would last for the rest of the year.

#### CELEBRATING PEACE ON CHRISTMAS DAY

Imagine it's 1914. The Great War, World War I, is months old. Europe is in turmoil and the United States is still years away from entering the war. You're a young British soldier who has been sent to the Western Front to fight against the Germans. You're scared and rightfully so. This war is different than wars of the past. Recently developed machine guns are heavily deployed across the Western Front inflicting unprecedented losses on each side of the battlefield. Chemical weapons designed to kill and maim are being deployed by both sides on a large scale for the first time. To combat the use of chemical weapons and defend themselves against machine gun fire, both sides dig trenches to protect themselves and fight in. These trenches are wrought with diseases like typhoid, dysentery, and cholera. You're weary from the conditions and the cold.

It's Christmas morning and a pensive haze has come over you as you think about being away from your family on Christmas. Slowly, from a German trench across the battlefield, a figure rises. He begins to cautiously walk towards your trench. He holds his open hands at shoulder height and clearly has no weapons. You ask yourself if this is a trick. The German soldier calls out. You strain to hear him, but can vaguely hear him say, "Merry Christmas," with a heavy accent. Almost simultaneously, soldiers from both sides slowly rise from their

trenches. They apprehensively begin to walk into the no-man's land between the two trenches.

and spent shell casings, on this day
British and German soldiers, enemies, will celebrate Christmas together. It is said that this was a testimony
for the desire for peace.

While not widespread on Christmas Day of 1914, these scenes actually unfolded in isolated places along the front. These spontaneous ceasefires to celebrate together serve as an enduring testimony for the desire of peace among people. If embattled men are able to come together in the most difficult of circumstances, how much easier should it be for us to spread peace amongst one another? Consider that as you go about this holiday. season. As always, consider the men and women who have served to protect the freedoms that we so often take for granted during this holiday season and reach out to those that are in need.




#### 1938 ADRIAN CRONAUER 2017
